The analysis of data collected from employees provides valuable insights into their perceptions regarding work-life balance.

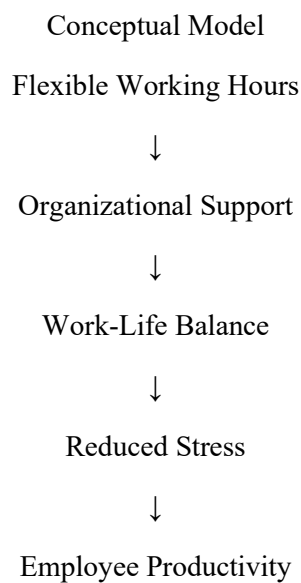
