Figure 1: Comparative Impact of NGOs in Pune

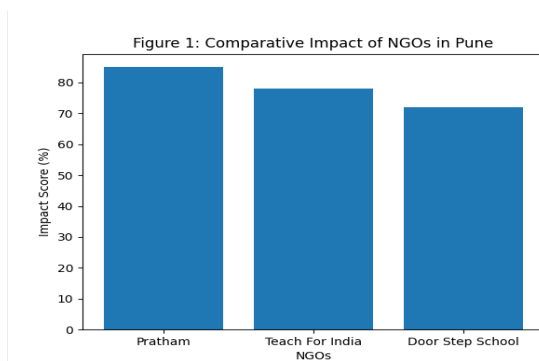
