According to Chambers, participatory development empowers rural communities by involving them in decision-making, resource management, and the evaluation of development activities. He introduced concepts such as Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), which enable local people to identify their own problems, assess available resources, and formulate practical solutions based on local knowledge and experience. This approach strengthens community ownership, improves transparency and accountability, and enhances the effectiveness and sustainability of development programmes.
- M. S. Swaminathan (2004), largely considered as the architect of India's Green Revolution, underlined the importance of agricultural expansion, food security, and rural prosperity in achieving sustainable development. He contended that improving agricultural productivity alone is insufficient unless it boosts farmers' wages, protects natural resources, and assures equitable access to technology and markets. Swaminathan called for a "Evergreen Revolution," which emphasizes increasing output through environmentally sustainable farming practices rather than resource-intensive ones. He emphasized the importance of scientific agriculture, effective water management, improved seed varieties, soil conservation, crop diversity, and climate-resilient farming techniques. He also stressed farmer-centered policy, agricultural research, extension services, and institutional support to improve rural livelihoods and alleviate poverty. His views continue to shape rural development policies that balance agricultural sustainability and socioeconomic growth. Swaminathan's vision is closely aligned with the aims of the Village-Based Growth and Rural Advancement Model (VBGRAM) Programme, which promotes sustainable agriculture, livelihood enhancement, natural resource management, and long-term rural prosperity.



- Dr. A. P. J. Abdul Kalam (2002) proposed the concept of Providing Urban Amenities in Rural Areas (PURA) as a novel approach to closing the development gap between rural and urban India. The PURA model was built around four types of connectivity: physical connectivity through roads and transportation, electronic connectivity through information and communication technology, knowledge connectivity through quality education and skill development, and economic connectivity through job opportunities and entrepreneurship. Kalam felt that these four pillars will transform villages into self-sufficient and economically vibrant communities, hence eliminating rural migration. He stressed that sustained rural development necessitates integrated planning, technological innovation, community participation, and strong governance. The PURA model influenced several subsequent rural development programs by illustrating how villages may become economic engines when infrastructure, education, technology, and livelihoods are built concurrently. The Village-Based Growth and Rural Advancement Model (VBGRAM) Programme exemplifies these concepts by encouraging integrated infrastructure, digital inclusion, entrepreneurship, skill development, and community-led development to accomplish holistic rural transformation.
- NITI Aayog (2018): Integrative and Inclusive Rural Development. The necessity for a comprehensive strategy to rural development was stressed by NITI Aayog (2018), which emphasized government program convergence, decentralized planning, digital governance, and active community participation.
